Program:

Kimberli introduced Aaron Olsen, the plant manager at the Veyance facility. The St. Marys plant was part of Goodyear for many years. The Engineered Products division of Goodyear was sold off in 2007 and purchased by a private equity firm.



Veyance as a company has 34 plants in 24 countries. Our factory was started in 1939 and currently employs 386 people in the 830,000 feet facility. Most of the production is in the Defense division, with about 35% in rubber track and 5% in custom products. This plant also does the rubber mixing for other Veyance facilities.

The St. Marys plant is a fully integrated manufacturing facility. The plant has in house design and testing. The testing lab here is the second best in the entire Veyance system. They have revenues between \$150,000,000.00 and \$200,000,000.00 per year.

When Veyance took over the facility the first focus was on changing the attitude of the workforce with respect to safety. They are currently

over 100 days without an OSHA reportable incident at the facility. With the focus on safety, Veyance has been recognized by the Rubber Manufacturers Association for improvement in health and safety.

Only 30% of the capacity of the plant is being used. They need to have reserved capacity for military contracts. They are a full line supplier to the military, making the treads for the M1A1 tanks and the Bradley fighting vehicles. They also make civilian rubber tracks for construction and agricultural vehicles. The tracks are highly engineered products, not just big rubber bands.
