Program

President-Elect Dan Burke introduced today's speaker Bill Wollpert of Goosebusters. Bill was the 3rd key employee of the company and has been with Goosebusters since 2005. Goosebusters is located in Centerville and service the Columbus. Dayton, Cincinnati, and St Marys area. They are committed to providing the most efficient, humane, and practical solutions to your Canadian geese problem. Goose control services are often used by schools, parks, office areas, residential communities, and golf courses.

Canadian geese were reportedly extirpated from Ohio at the end of the Civil War. In 1956, the Ohio Division of Wildlife initiated a giant Canadian goose restoration program. Twenty years later Canadian geese were found in 49 Ohio counties with a state population of 18,000. Today goose

nests have been found in all 88 counties and the goose population is estimated to be 84,000. This rapid goose growth can cause problems.

One of the most noticeable problems is goose droppings. One goose produces 1 to 3lbs of droppings every day! Goose droppings can carry e-coli bacteria and can create bacteria and algae problems in bodies of water. Also they can damage 5 square feet of turf daily and eat up to 3lbs of grass per day.



Geese are territorial birds and will not hesitate to protect their nest. An aggressive adult goose can easily knock down a child or senior citizen. Geese can fly up to 50mph and have been known to charge and hit humans in the face.

So if you have a Goose problem, who ya gonna call? Goosebusters!



The Goosebusters will make daily visits to the goose problem area to scare them away. Goosebusters use highly trained Labrador Retrievers and

Border Collies. The Collies will herd the geese on the property and then the Labradors charge at the geese to scare them away. Goosebusters do have other techniques to use as well, one being an all-natural grape spray that geese despise. Eventually the geese will get the idea that they are not welcome.
